Lower School Reports

I also encourage parents and students to analyse the reports together and assess their performance. This is a great opportunity to set firm and realistic goals of achievement or improvement for 2019. In many cases student performance is directly related to student attendance. An attendance rate below 90% places student performance in jeopardy. Students should only be absent from school if they are sick or have medical appointments. Far too often, students are absent from school for invalid reasons. I ask parents to support the school and their child in ensuring 90% attendance, as a minimum, is achieved in 2019.

It is the sixth time our students have sat their exams at Mater Dei and again we took precautions to make sure students were familiar with the environment. Bridgid Lafferty and myself took students to Mater Dei before the exams. There, they were given a tour of the school, shown the exam room, toilets and so on. We also had a Belridge staff member present at the start of each exam with spare equipment and identification forms. The whole exercise went very smoothly. I now wish all our Year 12's the best in their future endeavours.

Special exam arrangements for Year 12 in 2019

Students in Year 12, 2019 and their parents need to read this information carefully ...

Candidates who have a permanent or temporary disability, illness and/or specific learning disability that could disadvantage them in demonstrating their knowledge, skills and understandings in standard assessments may apply to the School Curriculum and Standards Authority to sit WACE examinations under special arrangements. Applications can be made for the **written** and/or **practical** examinations. Applications must be made by the school. The Authority will notify the school and candidate of the decision.

The granting of special examination arrangements is not automatic, but takes into account medical and/or psychometric evidence plus supporting school-based information related to the candidate's ability to access the examination. The role of special examination arrangements is to provide reasonable access to an examination. Schools should ensure that they have placed on record all current medical/psychological documents that relate to their decision to trial special arrangements for the student. Each application is considered individually, with decisions based on the nature of each examination to be sat by the candidate.

There are five sections:

Closing date for applications is 4 April 2019, but the process is long and complicated and needs to be started early in Term 1. If you think your son or daughter is eligible please contact me at the school on 9408 8000.

Wednesdays Period 5 Arrangements

It is a timely reminder for the parents of all Year 11 and 12 students that Wednesday period 5 is an important period on the timetable and that students should not make arrangements to use the period for non-school activities, such as work.

Year 12 ATAR students will be required every Wednesday period 5, and all other Senior School students will need to attend where meetings and information-giving sessions are organised. Also, students in Years 11 and 12 that do not meet deadlines for assessments, or are not up to date with their certificate courses, will be required to attend period 5 Wednesday until they complete this work. Mr Strickland will contact parents of students behind in their courses and Mr Notarpietro will do the same for certificate students. Failure to attend when required may result in loss of good standing.

Finally, I hope all Year 10 and 11 students have a good break and return refreshed for a great 2019.

... one Final Message

May I request that staff, parents and students be careful on the roads around the college. Students need to be extra careful whilst crossing the road when using mobile phones and need to remember to look right, then left and then right again. **Students need to take extra care crossing the exit from the main school car park as they are obscured from the vision of drivers by a solid wall, and also when crossing Ocean Reef Road, where the speed limit is 70kph. he end of 2018 is almost here and I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our wonderful parents/guardians for your continued support. Payment of Charges and Voluntary Contributions allows the College to provide the Learning Areas with teaching resources to ensure your student is provided with high quality programs.

2019 CHARGES & CONTRIBUTIONS & BOOK LISTS

You will have now received your charges and contribution sheets for 2019. Please look carefully at the course selections, particularly the elective subjects that have a high cost, and if you are in doubt about the final cost contact the school to discuss.

Books lists for 2019 will be run by OfficeMax via an online ordering system. You can opt to have your orders delivered to your home or collect from store. Details of how to order are set out on students' booklists which have now been mailed, together with contribution and charges sheets.

2019 SECONDARY ASSISTANCE SCHEME

The Department of Education provides an allowance to assist eligible families with secondary schooling costs. To be eligible for the allowance the parent/guardian must hold a Centrelink or Veterans' Affairs Card that represents a statement of income for the family. The allowance consists of two components:

- \$115 Clothing Allowance paid directly to the parent/guardian or the school.
- \$235 Educational Program Allowance paid directly to the school.

Application is made by the parent or guardian for students enrolled in Years 7-12. Application forms are to be completed during Term 1 at school and close on Friday 12 April 2019.

Eligibility Criteria

The Parent/Guardian must hold one the following cards:

- Centrelink **Family** Health Care Card
- Centrelink Pensioner Concession Card
- Veterans' Affairs Pensioner Concession Card (blue card)

2018

All Year 12 students received their VET Certificates in time for, or just after, graduation night, in what has been a difficult year for our partner RTOs. The national VET regulator, ASQA, has been applying close scrutiny to VET in schools in ensuring the 2015 RTO standards are not breached.

As a result of ASQA's scrutiny, all schools have had to submit evidence of student competency to each RTO for further validation and, if necessary, corrections. This has been a time consuming process for all concerned, and as a result many schools are still waiting for certificates completed by their Year 12s this year.

It has also been a difficult year for our ICT20115 / 30115 Certificate II and III in Information and Digital Media Technology students, their teacher, Mr O'Neil, and our partner RTO, AICT. As a result of some breaches to RTO standards, AICT was deregistered by ASQA in October, and has gone into receivership. Fortunately for our students, those who completed their certificates this year received their certificates prior to this action by ASQA, and as a result will have their certificates included in the WACE statement of achievement. We were one of only a few schools able to make this claim, largely through the hard work put in by Mr O'Neil and his students to finish all work during Term 3.



ASQA's decision to deregister AICT has led to our negotiating a new agreement with a different RTO, Skills Strategies International, which will be in place for 2019. For our Year 11 students affected, we will be negotiating credit transfer for units already completed in 2018, so there should be no disadvantage faced by any student - although both them and Mr O'Neil will have to adapt to the new platform, learning materials and assessments negotiated with Skills Strategies International.

PLANNING AHEAD FOR 2019

We will be holding a **Parent Information Night on Monday 25 February from 6.30pm to 7.30pm for families of all Year 11 VET students.** At this event, we will be outlining the structure of each of our VET certificates, the relationship with each of our RTOs, which issue qualifications achieved by our students, and timetabling arrangements for ADWPL, 'Workplace Learning'. We encourage all parents to attend, as VET and ADWPL is an important part of our WACE program and needs to be well understood by all parties involved. **Mark the date on your calendar now!**



PROGRESSIVE ACHIEVEMENT TESTING (PAT)

In the last few weeks, teachers in Years 7 to 10 English and Mathematics and Years 7 to 8 Science classes have been administering online PAT mathematics, reading comprehension and science assessments. This is the third year we have been using PAT to provide diagnostic information on individual and group performance and progress over time. The college uses the information to improve teaching and learning by providing insights into concepts and skills causing difficulty to students and to monitor progress in literacy and numeracy development against Australian norms. Any parent interested in their son or daughter's individual PAT assessment is welcome to contact the college.

GOOD STANDING:

- Is a status which is held by **all** students.
- It is related to their **BEHAVIOUR** and **ATTENDANCE**.
- The aim of **GOOD STANDING** is to encourage students to take greater responsibility for their behaviour, attendance and course participation at school and therefore, their education.
- All students are considered as having **GOOD STANDING** at the commencement of each year. Whether or not a student retains this status during the year depends on a number of factors outlined below:

BEHAVIOUR

Across all years, a student chooses to have their GOOD STANDING:

- **At risk** if he/she received 4 Student Behaviour Reports infringements/Learning Area Isolation.
- **Removed** if he/she is withdrawn or suspended.

ATTENDANCE

- A student's attendance must be **90% or above** to still hold GOOD STANDING.
- This data is analysed every 5 weeks.

Mr Haines started his teaching carrier when Malcolm Fraser was our Prime Minister and the year that North Melbourne won the VFL Grand Final.

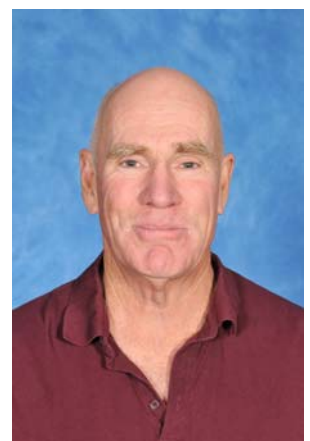

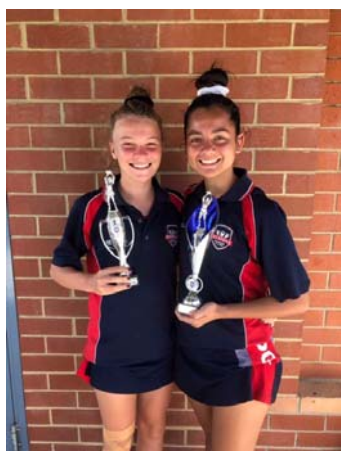

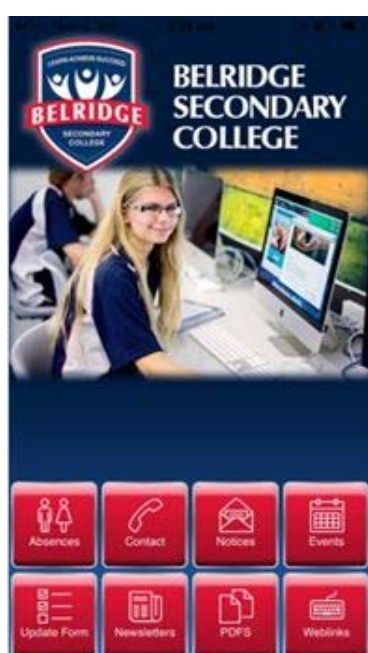
