wish to welcome all the Year 7 students and their parents/caregivers to the Belridge Secondary College community. Currently the Year 7 enrolment numbers stand at 191 which is fantastic for the College. We have also had new students from Years 8 - 12 join the school community transferring from other schools, interstate and overseas. I also welcome these students to Belridge SC.

Active parent/caregiver involvement is paramount to the educational achievement and success of the student. I look forward to establishing and maintaining strong and productive working relationships with all our new families to help achieve positive and rewarding outcomes for their children.

School Dress Code

I spoke to all the Year 7 and 8 students at their first assembly. I was impressed and proud on how smart all the students looked in their school uniforms. Belridge SC has a policy that *"if you are not in school dress you are not in the classroom"*. I encourage all students to maintain this high level of appearance and to take pride in themselves and their school.

Year 7 Elevate Education Program

On Monday 18 February, all Year 7 students participated in workshops during Periods 1 & 2 conducted by Elevate Education. The workshops were titled **'Study Skills Kick Start'** and **'Junior Management Time'** and were presented by university students. The presenters established instant connections with the students and made the sessions fun, interactive and informative. I believe this program will further assist the students in their transition to high school.

A Year 7 parent evening was held on Tuesday 19 February from 6.30 – 7.30pm facilitated by an Elevate Education presenter. Parents were presented with strategies to how best support their children both academically and socially.

Year 7 Welcome Barbeque

Save the Date! Wednesday 6 March

Many parents/caregivers took the opportunity to view the school during the 2018 Open and Orientation days. Invitations will be sent to attend the Year 7 welcome barbeque to be held on Wednesday 6 March (from 5 – 6.30pm). This is a great opportunity to meet staff and other parents/caregivers in an informal setting. We always have a fantastic roll up and it will be great to meet as many new families as possible.

Year 7 & 8 Vaccinations

Vaccination forms (for Year 8 2019) were distributed and returned to the school late last year. Email reminders with attachments were sent at the start of this year. If you wish your child to be immunised they need to be returned directly to the City of Joondalup.

Vaccination forms (for Year 7 2019) were distributed at the end of Week 1 and should have been returned to the school. If you haven't returned the forms and still require your child to be vaccinated, you need to return the forms directly to the City of Joondalup.

This year is the only year that both year groups will be vaccinated. From 2020, only the Year 7 students will be vaccinated.

The vaccinations are conducted over two (2) rounds. The first round of vaccinations will be held on Wednesday 27 March. The second round of vaccinations will be conducted on Wednesday 25 September. Please note these dates in your diary as there are no catch up sessions. Students absent on the day will need to get vaccinated through their local doctor.

Year 7 & 9 NAPLAN 2018

All Year 7 & 9 students will be participating in the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) in May. These are compulsory national tests. Parents will receive through the mail later this term information regarding this testing program. Students will prepare for these tests in their Mathematics and English classes, becoming familiar with the format, language, response types and time constraints.

Student performance is even more important as success in NAPLAN 9 determines whether students need to sit the Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessments (OLNA) in Year 10. The Western Australia Certificate of Education (WACE) – Years 11 & 12, requires students to achieve a prescribed minimum standard in literacy and numeracy to graduate. Students who achieve Band 8 in NAPLAN 9 for both literacy and numeracy are deemed to have met this minimum standard, so therefore will pre-qualify for the OLNA and do not have to sit it. Students will have two opportunities in Year 10 to attain this minimum standard. Further opportunities are available in Years 11 & 12 if necessary. Achieving Band 8 in NAPLAN 9 removes the pressure and stress in Year 10. Whereby in the past some students may not have tried their best in NAPLAN, I encourage all students to recognise the importance of these tests. I ask parents and caregivers to discuss these tests with their children and impress upon them to do their best.

Student Electives – Middle School

All Middle School students do an elective taster course. Students complete three electives in Semester 1 and three different electives in Semester 2. Students in a specialist or elite program should complete the full rotation of electives over two years. Unfortunately, due to timetable constraints students completing two specialist programs cannot complete any of the electives. This will not impact on their subject selections when entering Year 11.

elcome back to 2019 - It has been a smooth start to the school year and I have been impressed with the application of the vast majority of our senior students so far. There are a few matters that I need to highlight, so we can continue to have a successful year.

Year 12 Students Wednesday Period 5: Year 12 ATAR

All Year 12 ATAR students (students with 3 or more ATAR courses) must stay at school to study in the library.



Year 12 Non-ATAR and Year 11

Students and parents are reminded that Period 5 on Wednesday is an important part of senior students' programs. Students should not make permanent arrangements to be out of school at this time, because attendance at organised talks, information sessions and study sessions is **compulsory**.

Also, Year 11 and 12 students who fall behind in their assessments will be required to attend catch-up sessions in the library. To benefit the Senior School, the library is not available to Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 students at lunchtime and Period 5 on Wednesdays.

Senior School students will be informed when they are required to stay. If they are not required, they can leave at the start of Break 2. If they want to stay, they need to work and study in the library. Once they leave the school, they can not return that day.

Year 11 ATAR Students

On the second Thursday of the term, we suspended normal timetable for Year 11 ATAR students for periods 2 and 3 and presented them with seminars to improve their studying and time management skills. Feedback from most students was positive and they picked up some valuable tips and strategies.

Year 12 Students Sitting External Exams

The School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA) offers special examination arrangements to candidates with permanent or temporary disabilities who sit the WACE examinations. Provided full medical reports are provided, SCSA may grant special arrangements for conditions such as:-

- Vision or hearing impairment
- Learning disabilities, such as dyslexia or dysgraphia
- Medical conditions such as ADD/ADHD, illness, psychological, physical disability or fine motor disability.
- Conditions such as diabetes.

OLNA (Online Literacy & Numeracy Assessment)

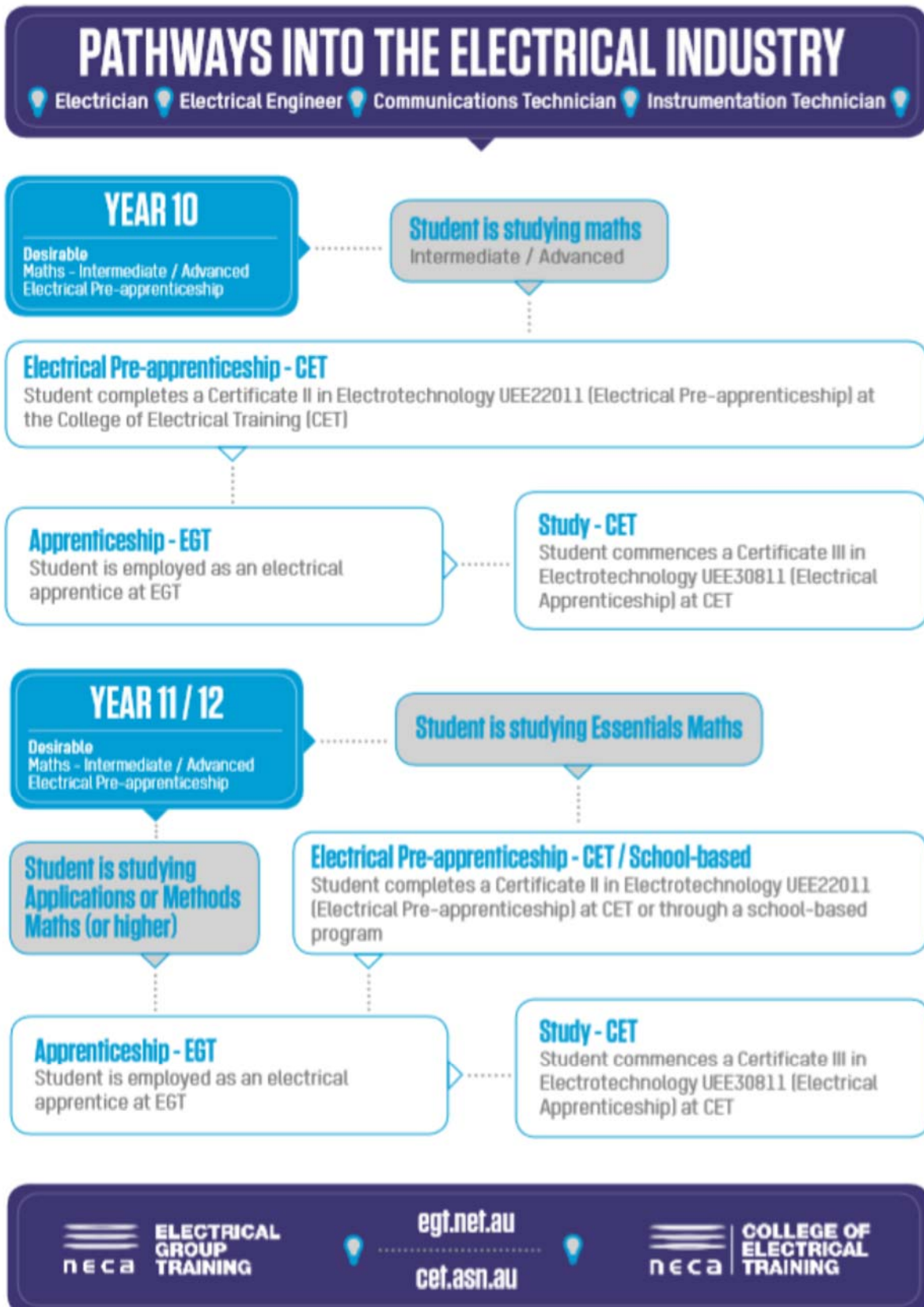
Round 1 OLNA Numeracy, Reading and Writing component assessments will be held during Weeks 5 and 6. Year 10 students who have not pre-qualified by achieving Band 8 or higher in Year 9 NAPLAN in 2018 have received an 'OLNA report', that states the components they are required to sit, along with a copy of the OLNA timetable (below). Year 11 and 12 students required to sit any of the assessments have also been given a copy of their OLNA report and timetable.

In the lead up to the assessments, students should attempt the practice and example tests available via a link on the college's OLNA Connect class, or at <http://assess.scsa.wa.edu.au/>. The Writing assessment is only available on the three days Tuesday 5 to Thursday 7 March, any students not in attendance on those days will have to wait until the next round of OLNA in September.

Student Services 2019



On behalf of the Student Services Team, we would like to welcome all students and their families to Belridge Secondary College. We hope that you are all re-energised after the summer break and are looking forward to the year ahead. A special welcome to our Year 7 students, and all our other new students to the school.

About Us

The Student Services Team support the health and wellbeing of students across the school. Both the Middle and the Senior School have a Head of Student Services who work in conjunction with the Year Coordinators, School Psychologist, Chaplain, School Community Nurse, along with all our teachers to foster a positive supportive environment for all our students. We have a number of exciting events coming up to foster this environment:

- The Peer Support Program is a new initiative where a group of 35 Year 10 students have been trained to become Peer Support Leaders. These leaders will be working with our new Year 7 students on an eight week program titled Strengthening our Connections.
- The Joondalup Mobile Youth Truck will be in the school regularly this term at lunch time with 2 youth workers happy to have a chat and integrate into our school community.
- Harmony Day is a celebration of our cultural diversity – a day of cultural respect for everyone who calls Australia home. Did you know we have 52 different cultures represented at Belridge SC. The message of Harmony Day is '*everyone belongs*'. We will be celebrating this day in Week 7 of this term.

Attendance Matters!

Students at Belridge SC are expected to be attending at or above 90% in line with The School Education Act 1999, where research clearly shows that students must attend school on a regular basis to gain the maximum benefit from schooling and optimise their life opportunities. Missing just 1 day per fortnight (during an average 10 week term) would see a student just meeting these requirements, so please remind your child that every day counts. Students must have 90% attendance to hold their Good Standing.

Absence Procedures

Absences for part of the day, all day, or for several days, must be covered by a written explanation, SMS or a phone call from the parent or guardian. These notes must be dated and specify the reasons for the absence/s. They should be brought to school by the student either before (if known) or returning from a period of absence and handed to the Form Teacher or the Student Services Office. It is essential that students be at school by 8:40am each day. They must also ensure that they are prompt to all classes.

Dress Code

We ask that all students wear the correct uniform which includes the appropriate school polo top and plain navy short, skirt, skort or pant of a modest length. Leggings, jeans and logos larger than a 20 cent piece and stripes are not permitted. Students in incorrect uniform will be asked to borrow a student services uniform and change for the day.

Good Standing Policy

Belridge SC has a Good Standing Policy that applies to all students. A loss of Good Standing can be due to a variety of reasons related to attendance, behaviour or school work. Please refer to page 7 of the [Student/Parent Handbook](#) located under **ABOUT US** on the [school website](#).

As noted earlier, there are a number of staff on the Student Services Team who assist staff, students and families to have a successful and enjoyable time at Belridge SC.

The main point of contact for each year group is the Form Teacher or, for more urgent serious matters, the Year Coordinator. The role of the Year Coordinator is to oversee the personal development and wellbeing of the students in their care. This involves the policing of the school uniform and the counselling of students in terms of any personal, academic or school problems they may encounter. They also liaise between students, teachers and parents when the need arises.

Hello from the
Community Health Nurse

The Community Health nurses, allocated from the Child and Adolescent Health Service to Belridge Secondary College, are Deb Lawrence and Jo Savoury.

Community Health Nurses are members of the Schools Student Services team and provide a valuable service to various high schools across the region. We work on different days at each school and our availability at Belridge Secondary College can be accessed at Administration or through Student Services.

Our service is not designed to provide care for sick students, or supply medications and medical supplies. In the event of students becoming sick or sustain an injury whilst at school we ask that you provide the school with emergency contact people (three contact people is preferable) who would be available to arrange transport, care and treatment for your child if required.

The school health centre is a place where adolescents can drop in or make appointments to discuss health and wellbeing issues. Some of the health issues that young people present with include; physical health concerns, infection and injuries, mental health, relationship problems and support, sexual health, nutrition and alcohol and other drugs. Students may independently seek assistance from the Community Health Nurse but can also be referred by parents and staff. If you would like to refer your child to the Community Health nurse, please do not hesitate to contact us through the school reception.

SECONDARY ASSISTANCE SCHEME PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Applications close 12 April 2019

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Western Australian Department of Education provides an allowance to assist eligible families with secondary schooling costs.

Parents/guardians must apply for the Secondary Assistance Scheme each school year (annually) – applications do not carry forward to future years.

To be eligible for the allowance the parent/guardian must hold a Department of Human Services (Centrelink) or Veterans' Affairs card that represents a statement of income for the family.

The allowance consists of two components:

- \$115 Clothing Allowance paid directly to the parent/guardian or the school.
- \$235 Educational Program Allowance paid directly to the school.

Application is made by the parent or guardian for student/s enrolled in Years 7–12 studying a full time secondary course at a Western Australian public school.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Parent or Guardian must hold one of the following cards:

- Department of Human Services (Centrelink) Health Care Card
- Department of Human Services (Centrelink) Pensioner Concession Card
- Veterans' Affairs Pensioner Concession Card

Please Note: The only Veterans' Affairs Card that meets the criteria is a blue card that is issued annually and expires in December each year. This card is income means tested.

The parent/guardian must be the holder of a card that is valid some time during first term. Students must be listed on claimant's card (except for some year 11 and 12 students, or in cases of disability/health reasons). In this instance, the school must sight both concession cards. The only exception to this is when a student holds their own health care card and has been declared independent by Centrelink (e.g. Living Away from Home). In this instance, a letter of confirmation from Centrelink needs to accompany the application.

The allowance is paid up to and including the year the student turns 18 years of age i.e. students born in 2000 or before are ineligible in 2019.

APPLICATION FORMS

Application forms should not be altered and are to be completed at the school during Term 1 only. If the form is completed prior to the commencement of Term 1 the school must complete the enrolment confirmation section to confirm attendance. (Forms dated by the school prior to

Term 1, 2019 will not be accepted). Please ensure to keep a photocopy of the signed form for school records.

LATE APPLICATIONS

Late applications will only be accepted in extenuating circumstances and must be accompanied with a written explanation.

Eligible interstate or overseas students who are enrolled after first term may apply for the allowance. Date of enrolment must be noted on the application.

CONTRIBUTIONS AND CHARGES

Schools will receive the Educational Program Allowance of \$235 for Secondary Assistance recipients. For students in Years 7 to 10 the Allowance will be paid directly to the school and in the first instance, will be applied towards the voluntary contribution. Any balance will be applied against charges or as negotiated with the parent/guardian. For students in Years 11 to 12 the Allowance will be applied to cover charges, in the first instance.

CLOTHING ALLOWANCE

The clothing allowance of \$115 will be paid to the parent/guardian unless indicated on the application form that you wish it to be paid to the school. If payment to the parent/guardian is requested, the payment will be deposited into the parent/guardian bank account. It can between take between 8 to 12 weeks to receive this payment.

PROCESSING OF PAYMENTS

Once the form is completed by the parent/guardian, the school will forward either the electronic file (via email) to the Financial Planning and Resourcing Directorate for processing whilst retaining the **original form at the school** or if completing applications manually, forward the **original forms** retaining a photocopy for the school records.

We will endeavour to have all clothing payments made to the parent/guardian by 31 May 2019.

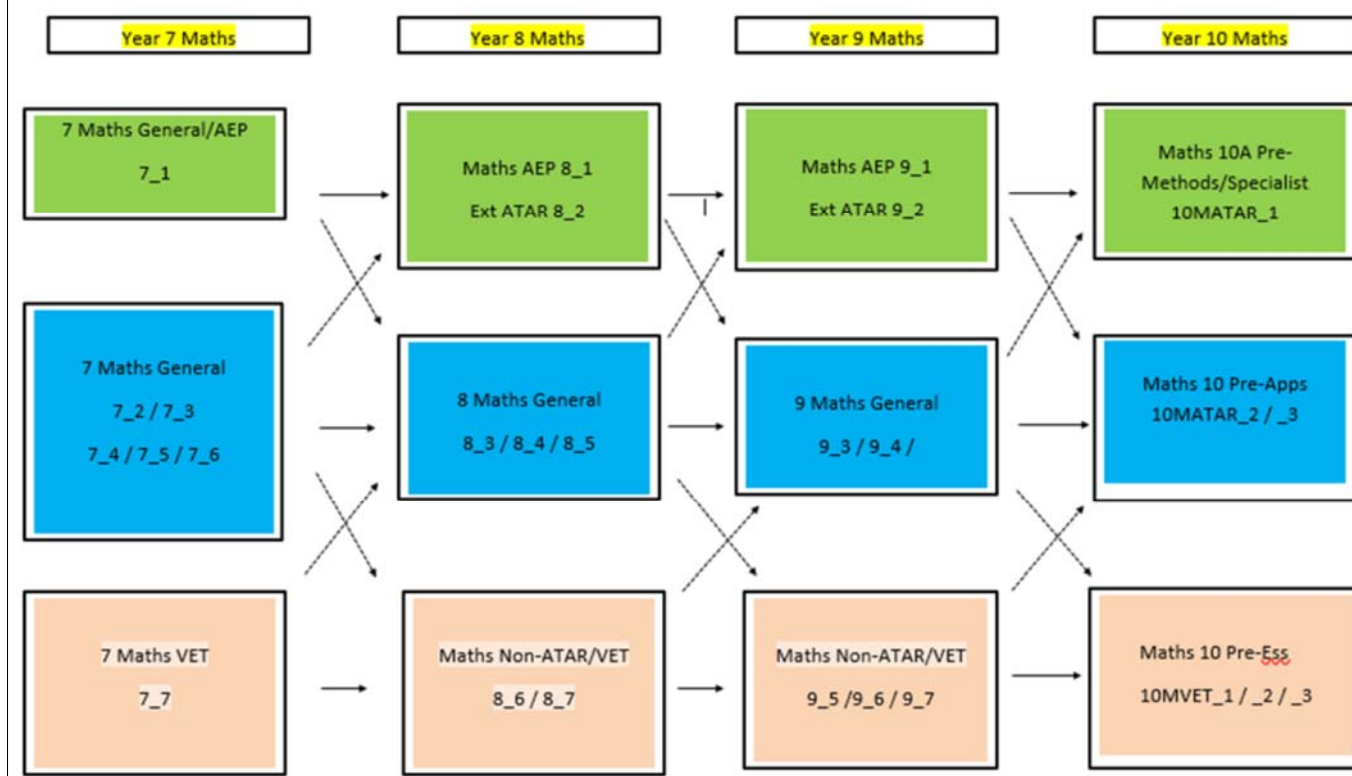

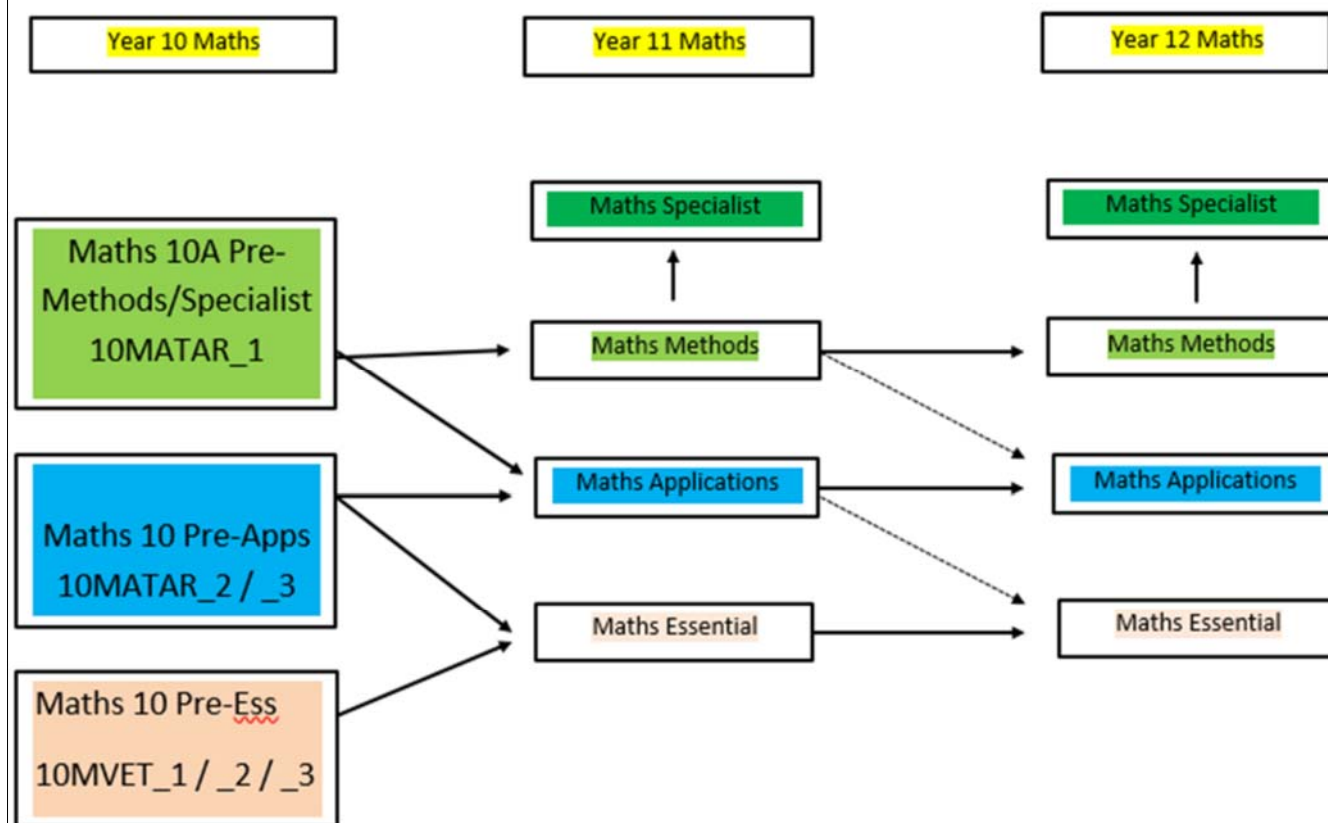

Whole School Literacy

This year, Belridge's whole school focus is on writing. Our aim is to accelerate students' progress and skills development in writing so we are putting our '*pedal to the metal*' with our new strategy 'Roadster Writing'.

**ACCELERATING WRITING
PROGRESS THROUGH
REGULAR TIMED WRITING**

'Roadster Writing' In a nutshell:

- At the end of every lesson
- 5 minutes timed writing
- A teacher-selected prompt
- A focus on one particular element of writing per fortnight (eg: capitals, vocabulary)
- Students count and record the number of words written at the end of 5 minutes
- Students set personal goals and track progress.



If every Year 7 and 8 student writes for five minutes at the end of the lesson for 75% of their lessons each week, by the end of the year, students will have had 62.5 hours of writing practice that they may otherwise not have had.

Across all learning areas, teachers of Years 7 and 8 are implementing Roadster Writing as a 'best practice' way of closing their lessons. Students are summarising their learning, reflecting on their responses to ideas, as well as developing the essential timed writing skills that will see them succeed in NAPLAN, OLNA and Senior School courses. As a 'universal' strategy (it's good for all learners) some teachers are also implementing it with other classes and year levels. In fact, it's so universal that even our Senior Management Group and the School Board are using it in their meetings.

If you'd like to get involved and support this strategy, please have a conversation with your child about the process. You might also like to encourage them to use it as a study tool at the end of the day to summarise what they've learned.
